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Rabbi's Message - Dov Gottesfeld

Shalom to all:

WHAT CONSTITUTES A TRUE LEADER?

(from the Torah's point of view)

That question should be on the mind of every eligible voter no matter how old he or she is. Those who are mindful of that question, no doubt, spend extra hours reading the newspapers, magazines, or watching the various television news, and news magazines to learn about each of the candidates. Their flavor of the week candidate changes, depending on new revelations about their candidate in the media – good or bad.

My totally limited survey and unscientific poll shows that when those mindful voters, whom I expected to vote with their minds and not with their hearts, when reaching a point of no return in the voting booth – ended up voting for their party's candidate-instead for whom they acknowledged was a more suitable candidate for the country this time

around. In other words, they end up making a decision just like those who are not mindful, and just vote for candidates from their own political party. It was the Party, which came first, not the country. Then, why bother being mindful about the election to begin with and wasting all that time doing research about the candidates?

I also learned from my limited survey that most voters did not have a total positive viewpoint of any politician or candidate for any office. The overall impression was that all the politicians didn't really care about the country. Their only concern, they said, was primarily more about themselves (the politicians), and their reelections than the voters who voted them into their office, to begin with; not to mention the ill manners in which they treat those other politicians from the other side of the aisle.

So, still, what constitutes a true leader – the one candidate, who could get the support of the entire nation regardless of his or her political affiliation? The majority of the responses from those voters I spoke to were about what they didn't like, rather than what they liked about one candidate or another.

Etz Chaim Children's Religious School 9:30-10 AM Realistically, nothing I had heard was new news to me. I've seen it, and I have heard it, and it is happening, and had happened not only in our country, but all over the world. Why am I bringing it up this time?

Because last week's Torah portion was about just that – what constitutes a true leader?

The name of the Torah portion is TERUMAH (Exodus 25-2). Most of the translations refer to Terumah as "offering", but I favor those few who translate it "Contribution", because of the implication of the story. Perhaps those candidates who would like to become leaders could learn a lesson or two about what constitutes a true leader.

In Terumah, Moses needed to unify the 12 tribes of the Israelites, who had joined him in the Exodus from Egypt, into one nation. Moses does it by creating a "national goal" to design, fabricate, construct, and erect a Tabernacle for God. That was in 1300 BCE. In order to make people feel equal to one another he requires a half a shekel, from every individual – rich and poor, knowing that every person could afford it.

In his second step Moses wanted the Israelites to be active participants in the "national goal". He did it by asking individuals whose hearts were moved by that goal to contribute either their talent or by means of materials needed. That approach was so successful, to a point where Moses requested that the people stop giving more items because they had enough for the Tabernacle. A similar example is the Haftorah portion of Terumah this week, I Kings 5:26- VI:13. In this portion, three hundred years later, King Solomon followed Moses' example and unified the nation with the same idea, to build the first temple in Jerusalem in 1000 BCE.

Three millenniums later, in the United States, President John F. Kennedy challenged and united the country behind "a national goal" to land on the moon.

I subscribe to the idea that in order to establish a unified country, a would be true leader should not make vague promises that might not materialize, but elicit the citizens and the residents of this great country to become united by creating a national project, which would light up the imagination of every individual, and require the ingenuity and skill of everyone in order to bring it to fruition, and from which current and future generations of Americans would benefit.

That one would be elected to become a true leader.

SYDNEY G. GUMPERTZ

In World War One, 250,000 Jews joined the military, over 3500 were killed, over 12,000 were wounded, and over 1,100 received decorations for bravery.

Sidney Gumpertz was born in San Rafael, California 24 October 1879 and entered service at Chicago, Illinois.

First Sergeant Gumpertz was awarded the Medal of Honor for action he took in the Bois-de-Forges, France. Gumpertz was a member of E Company, 132nd Infantry, 33rd Division which took part in The Meuse-Argonne Offensive which began on 26 September 1918.

On the 29 September, when the line in his sector was held up by machine gun fire, Sergeant Gumpertz left the platoon of which he was in command and started with two other soldiers through a heavy barrage toward the machine gun nest. His two companions soon became casualties from the bursting shells, but Gumpertz continued alone in the face of direct fire from the machine gun, jumped into the nest and silenced the gun and captured nine of the enemy crew.

Collected volumes will be sent to the Yiddish Book Center's repository in Amherst, Massachusetts, where they will be catalogued and made available to teachers, students, and university libraries throughout the world.

Yiddish literature once enjoyed enormous popularity among the area's immigrant Jewish population. Sacred books in Yiddish translation, as well as sets of Sholem Aleichem, Y.L. Peretz, and other Yiddish classics were to be found in almost every Jewish home. In later years, however, assimilation took its toll. Books that had been treasured by parents and grandparents were often packed away and forgotten by a new generation of Jews who read no Yiddish.

Today, interest in Yiddish language and literature is experiencing a startling resurgence. Academic courses in Yiddish language and literature have been introduced at many colleges and universities around the world. Long-forgotten Yiddish books are urgently needed by a new generation of students and scholars.

Efforts to collect Yiddish books began nationally in June of 1980 with the founding of the Yiddish Book Center--a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation and revitalization of Yiddish culture. To date the Center has recovered more than 1 million Yiddish books and has emerged as a major Jewish cultural organization, with initiatives in education, translation, and oral history as well as book collection.

The organizers hope that many volumes will be found in local homes on the Central Coast. All donations of Yiddish books and periodicals are welcome. The Center also accepts Yiddish sheet music and Ladino materials.
