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Rabbi's Message - Dov Gottesfeld

Shalom to all.

Next week we will start the fifth and the last book of the Torah Devarim - Deuteronomy.

The names of this week's Parshot are "Matot," which means "Tribes," and "Masei," which means "Journeys." They are found in Numbers 30:2 and 33:1.

In these two portions the writers rush to close up unresolved issues, and settle points that had occurred previously during the sojourn of the Israelite nation in the Sinai desert. Here I would like to discuss one of the issues, which for me makes all the difference for the existence of a just community, and consequently, a nation – any nation.

In this portion Moses conveys the laws governing the annulment of vows to the heads of the tribes of Israel. Obviously, there could not be an annulment of vows if there are not vows made to begin with.

A vow is between you, and yourself. A promise, is between you and someone else. I often hear at weddings a common error during the exchange of "vows" where the groom and the bride make "promises" to one another, rather them expressing what kind of a husband or wife they vow to become.

To break a promise (honorably), do the following: Look for a way to honor the original intent of the promise even though you're unable to follow through on the original plan.

Acknowledge that you're breaking a promise.

This isn't something you can mask or hide, so don't wait too long to tell the other person.

We learn from these portions that it is understandable that a person may break a promise made to another person. Unexpected circumstances may happen which could trigger such an act. Yet, one must re-examine, and reassess their promise. It is applicable not only concerning tangible goods, but also in terms of relationships between people. It is important that both sides come to amicable and mutual conclusions.

Vows, however, according to Judaism need to be annulled by a "professional" person familiar with the type – or the particulars of the given vows. In other words, if the issue has to do with marriage, a Jewish person could seek advice from a rabbi or a marriage counsellor. If the vow is concerning health, the person can seek a specialist doctor concerning his vow.

Judaism views a person's thoughts, vows, and promises as the foundations, and the pillars of a person's stature, and standing within the community. You are NOT only what you do, but also what you vow to become, and the respect and reverence you apply to your words.

PREPARE

Your most important weapon in the face of an active shooter is your prepared mind. Awareness is the first step. Awareness of the threat is knowing that there really are people out there who want to do us harm. While it is unlikely they will strike Temple Beth El in Santa Maria, the danger is non-the-less real.

Think about what you might do if there were an attack. Practice "situational awareness" wherever you go. Be aware of your environment. Pay attention to what's going on around you. Look for things that seem odd or out of place, or that could be dangerous. Take note of the exits in any facility you might enter. Have an escape plan in mind.

The current idea of what to do is known as Run, Hide, Fight. However, this is not meant to be a sequential procedure where you run if possible, if that's not possible, hide, and if neither one is possible, you fight. These are three different actions. For instance, you could run away, but instead decide to fight. Or if you have a good hiding place, do that first.

If you choose to run, run like hell. It's harder to hit a moving target. You need to create as much distance as possible between you and the shooter. This is where your escape planning comes in handy. Hide with the idea that you will eventually need to move. Know the difference between cover and concealment. Concealment is placing a visual barrier between yourself and the threat, like a curtain or a desk. Cover is something that can stop/slow a bullet, like a car or brick wall.

If you choose to fight, attack with anything. Act with physical aggression and throw items, a vase, a chair or a book, anything to distract and make it possible to neutralize the shooter. If you can yell at the same time, do it. Attempt to incapacitate the shooter. When the police arrive, • Remain calm and follow instructions • Put down any items in your hands (i.e., bags, jackets) • Raise hands and spread fingers • Keep hands visible at all times • Avoid quick movements toward officers such as holding on to them for safety • Avoid pointing, screaming or yelling • Do not stop to ask officers for help or direction when evacuating.

Remember that you are the first responder, till the police show up. And when confronted with violence, violence should not be the last resort.

The above text is the result of a presentation by the Santa Maria Police Department and my online research from police web sites. This article is intended to summarize the subject and to contribute to a discussion about temple security.

Collected volumes will be sent to the Yiddish Book Center's repository in Amherst, Massachusetts, where they will be catalogued and made available to teachers, students, and university libraries throughout the world.

Yiddish literature once enjoyed enormous popularity among the area's immigrant Jewish population. Sacred books in Yiddish translation, as well as sets of Sholem Aleichem, Y.L. Peretz, and other Yiddish classics were to be found in almost every Jewish home. In later years, however, assimilation took its toll. Books that had been treasured by parents and grandparents were often packed away and forgotten by a new generation of Jews who read no Yiddish.

Today, interest in Yiddish language and literature is experiencing a startling resurgence. Academic courses in Yiddish language and literature have been introduced at many colleges and universities around the world. Long-forgotten Yiddish books are urgently needed by a new generation of students and scholars.

Efforts to collect Yiddish books began nationally in June of 1980 with the founding of the Yiddish Book Center--a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation and revitalization of Yiddish culture. To date the Center has recovered more than 1 million Yiddish books and has emerged as a major Jewish cultural organization, with initiatives in education, translation, and oral history as well as book collection.

The organizers hope that many volumes will be found in local homes on the Central Coast. All donations of Yiddish books and periodicals are welcome. The Center also accepts Yiddish sheet music and Ladino materials
