Hebrew Lesson:

Hebrew Lesson: Face to Face with Panim

Face has many meanings in English. Humans, animals, and many extraterrestrials have faces. Even inanimate objects can have a face, as when you place a printed page face down in the copier or climb the south face of a mountain. One can gain, lose or save face. You may take words at face value. When you turn to something and focus attention, you face it. You may face up to a situation or face down an opponent. Your double-dealing acquaintance is two-faced.

The Hebrew word for face is *panim*, a plural form that can have a singular or plural meaning. The word pair form is *p'nay* (also spelled *p'nei*). It comes from the root verb *peh-nun-hay* meaning *turn to*. Like face, *Panim* morphs in unexpected ways. The Sabbath song Lecha Dodi refers to *P'nay Shabbat*, usually translated as the presence of Sabbath. (Incidentally, presence is an archaic meaning of the English word face.) The priestly blessing requests God to turn his face toward those being blessed.

A related word is *lifnay*, which means in front of or before. The Hebrew prefix *l*' usually translates as *to* or *for*, as in *L'chayim* (to life). Add that prefix to *p'nay* and you get *lifnay*, or *to the face of*. So, standing to the face of someone is equivalent to standing in front of them. Notice that the only difference between a *P* sound and an *F* sound in Hebrew is the presence or absence of the center dot (dagesh) in the letter *Peh* (or *Feh*).

Biblical examples of panim and lifnay include:

"P'nay ha-mayim" – the face (or surface) of the waters (Gen 1:2)

"tzadik *l'fanai* bador hazeh" – righteous before me in this generation (Gen 7:1, Noah)

"Vayikra Yaakov shem ha-makom *P'ni*el – ki ra-iti Elohim *panim el panim* ..." – And Jacob called the name of the place Peniel (*Face-of-*God) – 'For I have seen God *face to face* ...' (Gen 32:31)

"V'diber HaShem el Moshe panim el panim" – HaShem would speak to Moses face to face. (Exodus 33:11)

"Vayanas Moshe mifanav" – Moses fled from before it. (Ex 4:3)

"v'asitem lifnay paroh" – and perform them [wonders] before Pharaoh. (Ex 4:21)

"Panim b'panim diber HaShem imachem bahar" – Face to face HaShem spoke with you on the mountain. (Deut 5:4)

Since Hebrew is full of prefixes and suffixes, you will often find *p'nay* embedded in other words. The evening prayer Maariv aruvim contains "golayl or mi*pnay* choshech v'choshech mi*pnay* or" often translated as "rolling light from before darkness and darkness from before light." It can also be read as "rolling light from the *face* of darkness and darkness from the *face* of light."

In the Hashkivaynu is the phrase "V'hasayr satan mi'*l'fanay*nu umay'acharaynu." It can translate as "remove evil (or moral impediment or Satan) from *before* us and from behind us." Since *lifnay* can mean before, both in place and in time, the quote may refer to physical location in front of and to temporal location in the future (ahead of you in time) or past (before the present).

A more modern expression is: "Lo l'halvin panim." – Don't whiten a face, meaning Don't shame a person.

Panim keeps its Hebrew letters and meaning in Yiddish where it is pronounced punim (*u* as in *pu*t, emphasis on first syllable).

The next time you face a prayerbook or other Hebrew, you will recognize two more words.
